MOSQUITO HABITS!

I have recently returned from the third Northern European Conference on Travel Medicine (NECTM) in Hamburg, where I was presenting in a session on malaria. My topic was education on malaria for the adviser and for the traveller. The speaker after me was Dr Patricia Schlagenhauf, who addressed the subject of mosquito bite prevention. During her talk she discussed two recent papers that identified some fascinating detail. From the first paper: men are more attractive hosts to mosquitoes than women. Mosquitoes are attracted by a variety of cues but the most important are olfactory, including carbon dioxide, sweat and volatile skin products and men produce more of these attractants than women; insect repellents

are water-soluble and men generally sweat more than women, therefore men need to apply the products more frequently. From the second: beer consumption consistently increased an individual's attractiveness to mosquitoes.

The importance of this type of knowledge is that it can help us to adapt and individualise our advice to travellers - not that some men may be keen to hear it! If you would like to read the two
