SHAKEN NOT STIRRED

The Meningococcal Group A, C, W135 and Y conjugate vaccine Menveo . which was launched by Novartis Vaccines in the UK in 2010, has recently had a change to section 6.6 of the Summary of Product Characteristics. New instructions state that, when constituting the vaccine, instead of gently shaking the vial, one should 'invert and shake the vial vigorously and then withdraw 0.5ml of reconstituted product. Please note that it is normal for a small amount of liquid to remain in the vial following withdrawal of the dose'. As a new drug, Menveo ▼ has the black triangle label and is currently monitored intensively by the Commission on Human Medicines (CHM) and the Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA).
