EDUCATIONAL VIDEOS ON HEALTH FOR TRAVELLERS

Short videos are a useful medium for providing key health messages that, by nature of their content, command attention. Four such films have been recently published and are well worth watching and then recommending to your patients. NHS Choices has a huge bank of such videos on a number of health issues (visit www.nhs.uk/video/Pages/ medialibrary.aspx?Tag=Travel then go to the travel section). Among the latest is one entitled Travel Health, which covers all aspects of travel health advice, and another entitled Malaria. which includes a case study with a commentary about the disease from Professor David Hill, director of the National Travel Health Network and

Centre (NaTHNaC). A video about insect repellents forms part of the malaria prevention advice presented by the British naturalist, writer and television personality, Steve Backshall. The film, entitled *The Malaria Awareness*

the title. Perhaps my favourite is another on YouTube entitled Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) Friends and Family, which is about raising awareness of the need to take out travel insurance even if you are travelling abroad to stay with friends and family – the script is fast moving and fun.

PATIENT GROUP DIRECTIONS

Patient group directions (PGDs) are legal documents comprising written instructions for the supply or administration of medicines to groups of patients who may not be individually identified before presentation for treatment. As I train nurses on travel health in different areas of the UK, it is becoming increasingly apparent that many are still not aware of changes that occurred in 2008 regarding the use of PGDs for some travel vaccines. The

vaccines that are available free of charge under the NHS, such as hepatitis A, typhoid and polio (including any combination vaccine that incorporates these vaccines, for example Revaxis, Viatim, Hepatyrix, Twinrix and Ambirix) may be administered under a PGD but others must be administered using a patient-specific direction (PSD) or be prescribed by an independent

COMPRESSION SOCKS FOR THE ENGLAND FOOTBALL TEAM

Although more research is needed into the cause of travel-related deep-vein thrombosis (DVT), such events have been known to occur following long-haul air travel. Travellers at increased risk of DVT are advised

to consider the use of compression stockings, which reduce the risk of DVT and also reduce swelling associated with long-haul flights.
